Roundtable 1 – Strengthening the Three Pillars of Social Development: Poverty Eradication, Employment and Social Inclusion

Intervention by the Prime Minister of Tuvalu; Hon Feleti P Teo

- 1. Excellencies.
- 2. As a LDC and a Small Island Developing State, the ocean is central to life in Tuvalu.
- 3. It is the ocean that feeds and nourishes us, it is the ocean that employs us, and it is the ocean that defines us as a people with distinct cultures and traditions.
- 4. A healthy ocean means a healthy Tuvalu.
- 5. When the ocean suffers, Tuvalu also suffers.
- 6. That is why social development and environmental security go hand in hand.
- 7. Poverty cannot be reduced, nor decent work created, if our land and livelihoods disappear beneath the rising seas.
- 8. My government, therefore, has made inclusivity a national priority, ensuring that every Tuvaluan, regardless of gender, age, or ability, can contribute to and benefit from development.
- 9. Our social strength lies in our community spirit, families and island communities that share what they have and look after one another.
- 10. These strong social bonds protect us from inequality and exclusion.
- 11. But those social bonds must now be matched by global solidarity.
- 12. Because for Tuvalu, security means dignity, the safety to live on our islands, to work, and to dream of a future for our children.
- 13. We are building an inclusive, caring, and sustainable economy, powered by the blue and green economy from sustainable fisheries to renewable energy, creating jobs while protecting nature.
- 14. We invest in our youths, unlocking innovation and purpose.
- 15. We empower our women who are already leading in enterprise and community life.

- 16. And we include persons with disabilities, ensuring they can fully participate in shaping our nation's future.
- 17. This is the meaning of social justice for Tuvalu, where human rights, cultural identity, and the right to development must move and evolve together.
- 18. But we cannot do it alone.
- 19. We need global partnerships that value inclusivity, equity, and shared prosperity partnerships that recognize both the vulnerabilities and the strengths of small islands nations.
- 20. Together, we can all build a future where the ocean sustains us, where communities rise together, and where no one, *truly no one* is left behind.
