Sustained support will allow vulnerable developing states like our Island Kingdom to make bold investments in health, education, and social protection systems — building the foundations for lasting resilience and inclusive growth.

This Summit offers a timely opportunity to renew our shared commitment to people-centered development — a commitment that recognizes that social progress, environmental sustainability, and economic opportunity are inseparable.

In closing, Tonga reaffirms its steadfast commitment to the full implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Achieving our common goals requires strengthened global partnerships, continued consensus-building, and enhanced technical cooperation, research, and innovation — to ensure that No Nation, and No Person, is left behind.
