*Our welfare reforms now extend protection to informal workers and integrate climate and disaster resilience — because **poverty cannot be reduced if vulnerability remains.***

We also believe that decent work is the heartbeat of social justice.

*Through our Medium-Term Development Plan 2025–2029, Indonesia is creating jobs that are **not only productive but sustainable.***

Our Green Workforce Roadmap seeks to generate five million green jobs by 2029, powered by renewable energy, sustainable agriculture, and the circular economy.

*At the same time, our National Strategy on Business and Human Rights promotes responsible business conduct, gender equality, and protection for persons with disabilities and migrant workers — **ensuring that growth never comes at the expense of fairness.***
